Law Enforcement Model Policy & Procedures for Reports of Missing Persons

The following is a list of requirements as defined in Brandon's Law:

- Accept without delay *any* report of a missing person
 - o Conduct preliminary investigation to determine whether the person is missing
 - If missing, determine whether the person is endangered as defined in statute (see back)

Missing and endangered

- Immediately enter identifying and descriptive information into NCIC, include vehicle information, known aliases, additional dates of birth
- o Immediately consult with the BCA by calling 651-793-7000
- Promptly notify all appropriate law enforcement agencies (county, regional, statewide, other states where appropriate).

Nlets administrative message

Police radio broadcast/alert

• Under 21 years of age, regardless of determination

 Immediately enter identifying and descriptive information into NCIC, include vehicle information, known aliases, additional dates of birth

• Information gathering requirements

- Obtain recent photo of individual to aide in locating/identifying
 - Use of a DL photo allowed under 171.07 Subd 1a.(2)
- o Enter photo into NCIC Missing Person Entry
- o Missing for 30 days collect:
 - DNA samples
 - Dental information and x-rays
 - Additional photos
 - Fingerprints
 - Review case file to determine whether additional information indicates person is endangered
 - If determined to be endangered, change status in NCIC

Definitions

Missing means the status of a person after a law enforcement agency that has received a report of a missing person has conducted a preliminary investigation and determined that the person cannot be located.

Endangered means that a law enforcement official has received sufficient evidence that the missing person is at risk of physical injury or death. The following circumstances indicate that a missing person is at risk of physical injury or death:

- The person is missing as a result of a confirmed abduction or under circumstances that indicate that the person's disappearance was not voluntary
- The person is missing under known dangerous circumstances
- The person is missing more than 30 days
- o The person is under the age of 21 and at least one other factor in this paragraph is applicable
- There is evidence the person is in need of medical attention or prescription medication such that it
 will have a serious adverse effect on the person's health if the person does not receive the needed
 care or medication
- The person does not have a pattern of running away or disappearing
- o The person is mentally impaired
- o There is evidence that the person may have been abducted by a noncustodial parent
- o The person has been the subject of past threats or acts of violence
- There is evidence the person is lost in the wilderness, backcountry, or outdoors where survival is precarious and immediate and effective investigation and search and rescue efforts are critical
- Any other factor that the law enforcement agency deems to indicate that the person may be at risk of physical injury or death, including a determination by another law enforcement agency that the person is missing and endangered
