

What is Loss of Support?

Loss of support payments are made to the dependents of a deceased victim to replace a portion of the support the victim was providing prior to his/her death. Dependents include the spouse or domestic partner, and children under the age of 18.

The spouse/domestic partner must provide a marriage certificate or other supporting documentation proving they qualify as a domestic partner.

The person who has custody of the minor children should file the claim. Birth certificates must be provided for the minor children.

The loss of support payment rate is set at the beginning of each fiscal year. The current rate is \$400 a month for each dependent.

Loss of support is paid annually for three years, or until the child turns 18 years old or the \$50,000 maximum has been met. After three years, the claim will be reviewed to determine if the dependents are still in need of financial assistance.

Assistance for Survivors

The Minnesota Crime Victims Reparations Board can help ease the financial burdens faced by survivors. If someone in your family was killed in a homicide or drunk driving, hit and run, or criminal vehicular operation (CVO) crash, you may be eligible for additional benefits through the Board. Even if you have already submitted your application form, please do not hesitate to contact our office if you are interested in pursuing additional benefits.

Who is eligible?

In cases involving a death resulting from a homicide or drunk driving, hit and run or CVO crash, the following persons may apply for benefits:

- ◆ A family member, a dependent of the victim, or the estate of the victim.
- ◆ A person that paid for some of the services for the victim.
- ◆ The guardian, guardian ad litem, conservator or authorized agent of the victim, or the victim's dependents.

How do I apply?

- ◆ If you have already submitted an application form, send us a letter describing the additional expenses you would like the Board to consider paying. Please attach any receipts.
- ◆ If you have not yet filed a claim, please contact our office to request an application form. You must submit an application form within three years of the crime.

It takes about four months to receive funds from the Board.

What expenses may be paid?

The following expenses may be paid by the Board if they were not covered by your insurance or other sources of funding (not including life insurance):

- ◆ **Funeral Expenses.** Up to \$7500 of your losses, including funeral services, cemetery costs, transportation of the body, obituaries, church rental, food, flowers, and clothing for the victim. Up to \$1,000 of this amount may be used for transportation and lodging for the family to attend the funeral.
- ◆ **Headstone.** An additional \$1,000 is available to purchase a headstone.

- ◆ **Crime Scene Cleanup.** Considered on a case-by-case basis.
- ◆ **Mental Health Costs.** Counseling that is needed as a result of the crime, including individual or group therapy. Those covered include parents, spouse/domestic partner, children, siblings and grandparents.
- ◆ **Loss of Support.** Benefits for dependents of the deceased victim to replace a portion of the victim's financial contribution to the family. (See back for more information.)
- ◆ **Lost Wages.** Loss of income due to the emotional injury that resulted directly from the crime. Those covered include: parents and spouse/domestic partner, up to 52 weeks. Children, grandparents, and siblings, up to 6 weeks.
- ◆ **Child Care.** Child care costs if the service was normally provided by the victim prior to the crime.
- ◆ **Medical Costs.** Medical expenses directly related to the crime including ambulance, hospital, physician and prescriptions.

The maximum amount of reparations allowed for all claims filed on behalf of one victim is \$50,000.
