Red Cross Smoke Alarm Program

You may be aware of the American Red Cross commitment to reduce death and injury from home fires by 25 percent in five years, but have you looked at their <u>Home Fire Preparedness Campaign</u>? Click on the resources tab for disaster/hazard education material, a home fire-risk mapping tool, fire safety education resources and coalition resources. The risk mapping tool is a simple, GIS-based map that uses NFIRS data to give you an easy-to-read map of fires, fire deaths and injuries. Under the training tab, find guides for alarm installer, documentation, home visit record and a number of training videos.

If you havenot yet partnered with the American Red Cross to do a smoke alarm installation program, you can connect with Red Cross through the website and see if that's a possibility in your community.

Fire Prevention Week

Fire Prevention Week 2015 is October 4-10. I am sure most of you are already making plans for special events, trainings and open houses. Once again I will collect and publish a list of fire department open houses around the state. Send me your date, time, location and event details to be included on the list.

This year's NFPA theme is "Hear the Beep Where You Sleep. Every Bedroom Needs a Working Smoke Alarm." The focus is on the key message of having working smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of the home. NFPA has lots of resources on their website to assist in using the Fire Prevention Week theme.

Also, NFPA wants to see how you are using the Fire Prevention Week products. Just snap a photo using NFPA products during an open house, classroom visit, sporting event or any other event you're hosting for Fire Prevention Week. Next, complete an online application, which will be posted on the website this fall. Once you complete the online form you will be entered to win one of 10 Sports Safety Boxes from NFPA (valued at over \$400). 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Upgrades and Transitions in 9-1-1 Webinar

State and local 9-1-1 professionals, along with 9-1-1 stakeholders, are invited to attend a webinar entitled "State of 911." The webinar will be Tuesday, August 11, 12-1 p.m. Eastern Time. Topics to be included are:

- Similarities and differences between Nationwide Public Safety Broadband (FirstNet) and Next Generation 911 (NG9-1-1)
- Opportunities for interconnectivity between FirstNet and NG911
- Updates from Indiana's implementation of Text-to-911
- Q&A session

If interested in attending the webinar you must <u>pre-register</u>. "State of 911" webinars are scheduled every other month and archived at 911.gov. These are national webinars, so be sure to check with your local jurisdictions for the current trends in your area.

National Preparedness Month

September is National Preparedness Month. This year's theme is: "Don't Wait. Communicate. Make your emergency plan today." The campaign is asking everyone to take action to make a plan with their communities, families and pets. Plan ways to stay safe and communicate during the types of disasters that could affect any community.

Stove Top Fire Stops

Lending Library

When you need additional fire prevention resources, check out the Fire Marshal Division lending library. Need a Sparky the Fire Dog costume or a Sparky video? Both are available to be checked out. Other items in the lending library include children's books with a fire department, fire truck or fire prevention message. Videos cover topics from safe use of fire extinguishers to evacuation and carbon monoxide. The library also has a spinning wheel that can add some "fun and games" to your next event.

One new addition is a photo backdrop that can be set up for selfies, or for photos taken by someone from the fire department. The backdrop, when set up, is approximately 8 feet tall and 6 feet wide. It does roll down into a small case for easy transport. While there are lots of great spots to take a picture of kids at a fire station this one includes the reminder for kids to leave fire alone.

National Campus Fire Safety Month

September is National Campus Fire Safety Month and the Michael H. Minger Foundation has produced a series of free videos titled, "Did You Know?" to help schools and communities i reach college students. Each of the videos is about a minute long, and features students providing fire safety information such as, "Did you know that smoking is the leading cause of fire deaths?" along with messages on exits, cooking and smoke alarms.

The videos and other free resources can be found on the <u>Minger Foundation website</u>. There are posters, fact sheets, an RA Guide to Fire Safety, and a teaching guide on working with students with disabilities.

Safety Tip Sheets

Are you looking for some tip sheets to hand out? There is a variety of tip sheets on the State Fire Marshal Website and the NFPA website. Both offer tip sheets in several languages, and some can be customized. I encourage you to download the sheets you need and add your own department logo and contact information. This is a great way to add resources with only the cost of printing! The <u>State Fire Marshal fact sheets</u> can be found on the website under the public education tab. The <u>NFPA tip sheets</u> appear in English; <u>other languages</u> can be found by clicking a link at the bottom of the <u>safety tip sheet page</u>. Many are designed with limited reading required and more illustrations to suit varying levels of literacy.

NFPA Mini-Lessons

Another resource you might find useful on the NFPA website is <u>the10-minute mini-lesson plans</u>. There are currently six different mini-lessons that include cooking fires, smoke alarms, carbon monoxide alarms, preventing carbon monoxide poisoning, calling 9-1-1 from a mobile phone and "Hear the beep where you sleep." Each of these lessons directs you on who the audience should be, the lesson objective and simple steps to teach the topic. If there are other topics you'd like to see added, let me know and I will pass that along to NFPA — they want to know what educators need to do their jobs better!

Wildfire Preparedness Toolkit

The National Preparedness Community through FEMA has developed a <u>downloadable Wildfire Preparedness Toolkit</u>. The kit includes social media messages, tip and resources.

According to The National Preparedness Community, the top three ways to prepare for a wildfire are:

- Design and landscape your home with wildfire safety in mind. Select materials and plans that help contain fire rather than fuel it.
- Teach each family member how to use a fire extinguisher (ABC type) and show them where it's kept.
- Regularly clean roof and gutters.
